The Children's Network is dedicated to improving the lives of children in Solano County through education, advocacy, coordination of community services and community-based collaboratives. Our vision is that all children of Solano County will reach adulthood having experienced a safe, healthy and nurturing environment. Quality child care is a key component of this environment.

AB 1001 is aligned with our mission and vision as it will strengthen the local county infrastructure to ensure that California's increased state investments in early care and education are well-coordinated at the local level with effective needs assessment and service planning. The bill will ensure there is a seat at the planning table for all the critical and diverse ECE and community stakeholders to ensure comprehensive, equitable planning.

In 1997, the Local Child Care and Development Planning Councils (LPCs) were established with the intent of bringing together child care providers, parents, and key stakeholders in each county to identify local childcare needs and priorities. Since then, much has changed. New initiatives, such as First 5 and QRIS, have been created, family needs have changed, federal and state laws have been amended, and a new K12 system of support has emerged. Meanwhile, urgent concerns such as teacher / provider compensation, lack of facilities, and lack of care for children with special needs have intensified. The funding and structure of LPCs has not kept pace with these changes!

While LPCs continue to play an important role with stakeholders and providers, they are well suited to address other gaps in the ECE system. Better local planning would maximize the number of children receiving services and would help California get the most from its investment.

For these reasons, we wholeheartedly support AB 1001. For a very modest investment of \$10 million in funding, California can ensure that its large ECE investments are used effectively at the local level. We respectfully request that AB 1001 (Ting) be included in the Assembly Budget.

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




